To all our families—

Happy Veterans' Day! I had the opportunity to visit a couple of schools today to see their programs. Both were very powerful. We honored veterans from all branches of the service, and the students were able to interact with the veterans. It was a good day for students to understand the commitment of service.

The cold wind today brings to mind that the weather will be changing soon. While this has been an outstanding fall, inclement weather, at least one to two days of it, is inevitable. In light of this, I want to take the opportunity to review our snow day protocols. The easiest of these is that if you do not hear from the school, then we are in session. We will only call when we are canceling school. This means that if we have canceled school for two days in a row, and we do not call third day, then we are in session. As a rule, the area superintendents work together to get our message out as soon as possible. We will try to hit the 6:00 p.m. news, the 10:00 p.m. news, and, if needed the 6:00 a.m. news. We try to make our decision the night before, if it is possible. Once the decision is made, Troy 30-C will call you, email you, tweet it (@troy30c), post it on our website, and call the local media outlets. In the end, we will always err on the side of student safety whether it be severe cold or unsafe travel. We are happy to serve you, and we will communicate our school closings effectively.

We have parent-teacher conferences on November 23 and 24. Please try to schedule a conference with your student's teacher. You are the third leg of the education triangle (student—teacher—parent), and we look forward to the opportunity to share the good news about your student's progress. The recording of progress has changed since we were all in school. As a K-4 parent, I encourage you to review the <u>Parent Guide to Standards Based Reporting</u>, and for grades 5-8, the <u>report card explanations</u>. The key to our assessment of student progress is understanding that the target is student demonstration of mastery independently and consistently. Our report card, then, is simply a report of your student's degree of independence and consistency in demonstrating mastery of a concept. Please come out to our conferences and find out what goal your student has set and what progress he or she is making toward that target.

The holiday season is soon to be upon us. We know that these days bring great joy, and sometimes, some stress for families. Please make us aware of any changes or concerns your student might be bringing to school so we can support you at home. I always look forward to the holiday season and wish for all of you a happy and peaceful Thanksgiving as a start to the season. As always, please feel free to contact us with questions, concerns, and suggestions that you have about the education of your student.


# News from Second Grade!

Can you believe we've finished our <u>first trimester</u> already? We're a little older, a little wiser, and a little more comfortable in class. So, what better time is there to talk about how far we've come?

Parent-Teacher conferences are coming up on Monday, November 23 and Tuesday, November 24, and these conversations are very important for everyone involved. This is the time to focus on the STUDENT: successes, struggles, reflections of the past, and wishes for the future. So, here are some thoughts about conferences and student progress:

- 1. We will base our 20-minute conversation on what you and your child wrote down on your conference forms. Yours was the purple sheet sent home on November 10, and your child's was filled out in class on white paper.
- 2. I <u>highly</u> encourage bringing your child to the conference. They have filled out a reflection form too, and they should advocate for their education, just like you and me.
- 3. The conference should be about progress in school, not numbers on a report card. I will make report card information available (in paper and online) so you can read over it at home. I can meet with you about these specifics at another time, if you have any questions.
- 4. Please come at least 5 minutes early. I want to stay on schedule so every family gets their well-deserved 20 minutes with me.

I am very excited to have these conferences, and I hope you are too. I cannot wait to hear your thoughts about how ACE is going, and I cannot wait to tell you how much your child has grown in just a few months!

### Art Happenings

This past month, in Art students learned about different Hispanic cultures in celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month. The students worked very hard to create wonderful mask from different cultures.

Fourth grade students created Mexican Luchador Wrestling Masks. The students identified a cause that they were passionate about. They then created a three dimensional paper mache mask and decorated to represent a cause that they were passionate about in their community. Students choose such causes as: fight for freedom, fight to end cancer, prevent bullying, and much more.

In third grade students made masks for Carnival. In Puerto Rico, Vejigante masks are made to represent the devil. In Columbia masks are very ornate and beautiful. Students selected a style and designed their own three dimensional paper mache mask.





To prepare for the Veterans Day Assembly, second grade students created paper dolls of themselves that represented G.I. Joe's. Students created one Military outfit and one everyday outfit. Students drew a background to which they attached their paper doll and clothing.

First grade students made masks on milk jugs that symbolize sugar skulls for Dia De Los Muertos or Day of the Dead. Students painted their mask to represent a person or pet who they had loved and lost.

The Kindergarten classes created masks and serapes for Danza De Los Viejitos or Dance of the Old People. Kindergarten students drew the mask by identifying lines and shapes within the face.

On the Serape students experimented with printmaking processes to create lines.

In November, the artists at Troy Shorewood are looking forward to painting abstract art and self portraits.
